## What Happened to Hopedale?

At the annual meeting of the Hopedale Community in 1856, the Community President, Ebenezer Draper, expressed his hope that Hopedale would "become more and more a light to those around us, proving to the world that Christian Socialism opens a more excellent way." So successful did the Community appear that plans were made to start another community in Minnesota, then just being settled.

Yet just six weeks later, that same Ebenezer Draper announced that the financial state of the Community was "so desperate and hopeless" that he and his brother George, who together controlled 3/4 of the community's stock, had decided to withdraw their assets. Thus ended the great experiment, that was to have shown the world a new and better way to live.

After the calamity, Adin Ballou resolved "to search out the errors and mistakes which had caused it," and to publish his findings "as admonitions and warnings to philanthropists and social reformers in coming generations."

Did he succeed? Do we now understand what happened? Come to our next meeting and find out.

### **Bicentennial Plans**

April 23, 2003 will mark Adin Ballou's 200<sup>th</sup> birthday. In the spirit of the Hopedale Community, which celebrated an assortment of "entertainments, festivals, and gala-days," we hope to arrange a celebration that will honor his memory, introduce his ideas to as many people as possible, and (as he put it) "gratify and delight whomsoever might be in attendance."
