### Unitarian Universalist Association Honors Adin Ballou

At this year's Adin Ballou Peace Lecture, at the Unitarian Universalist Association's General Assembly in June, conscientious objectors from World War II through the Gulf War told their stories and reflected on the meaning of the choices they made.

On October 26, the UUA's Clara Barton District (central Massachusetts and the Connecticut Valley) will hold their annual district gathering in Hopedale. FAB members Lynn and Peter Hughes will present a workshop on "Ideals and Experience: Adin Ballou and the Practical Christians, Building Community at Hopedale."

### Historic Hopedale

In June 2002, the Hopedale Village Historic District was added to the National Park Service's Register of Historic Places.

The Early Hopedale Community Walking Tour, produced by Friends of Adin Ballou with a grant from the Blackstone Valley Heritage Corridor, has been completed. The 16-page illustrated booklet covers 7 sites and contains a wealth of information about the Community and its people. Special thanks to Jeanne Kinney for putting it all together!
