Bylaws

"The Council would respectfully suggest that the time has now arrived when it is necessary for the Community to enact certain important By-Laws..."

Report of the Executive Council, Hopedale Community, August 1841

Adin Ballou appreciated the need to formalize the ways people join together. The people who would become the Hopedale Community developed and approved the "Constitution of the Fraternal Communion" in January 1841, over a year before the first person moved onto the old house in The Dale. Ballou later expanded these ideas, laying out a constitution for the Practical Christian Republic. His document provides fundamental articles to structure and govern a just society, well-organized for the common good.

"The proposed plan of organization ... was examined, article by article, section by section, discussed in all its details, and, after successive adjournments, unanimously adopted..."

This first constitution was not perfect. It was amended several times, and finally completely re-written in 1847. But it was good enough to allow the Community to survive, avoiding the perils of authoritarian dictatorship on one hand, or quarrelsome disorder on the other, that caused so many other communities to fail.

"As we were all human, possessed of the frailties and imperfections ... of our common nature, we had within us the elements of unrest, disorder, confusion..."
